Planning Commission News

The Planning Commission has received three new proposals for Subdivision and Land Developments in 2009.



- 1) The Edwin Van Dam land development plan situated along Gravel Pike, in the highway commercial district, for a greenhouse complex to grow wholesale herbs. This plan has been directed to the Zoning Hearing Board for relief from Article IX Section 904.A. and Article XIII Section 1306.G.2.r. in regard to the number of parking spaces;
- 2) The Hilgar, Young & McCluskey 67.6 acre 2 lot subdivision that is along Hunter Forge Road and Old Mill Road. This plan has also been directed to the Zoning Hearing Board for a variance from Article V Section 504 B. regarding lot width at street line;
- 3) The Forgedale Properties consisting of 4 lots along Forgedale Road. This plan is being contested because of a discrepancy in property lines delineating District and Hereford Townships.

All other plans submitted from previous years have been granted extensions or are on hold due to the downturn in housing starts, the waiting for permits from outside agencies and property line discrepancies. These include:

- 1) Clemmer Appold – an 82 lot subdivision on County Line Road and Tollgate Road.
- 2) Saracino – 3 lot subdivision on Township Road
- 3) Brown – 3 lot subdivision on Crow Road.
- 4) James Mack – two part subdivision consisting of 8 and 11 lots on Gravel Pike and Shuler Road.

The Planning Commission continues to work closely with John Snook from Brandywine Conservancy to update the Hereford Zoning Ordinance. His expertise in the concept of TDR's has taken a stronghold in various other communities which can be appreciated in the Mercury article dated February 16th, 2009, "Fast Growing Limerick Looking into New Development Model."

A public hearing has been scheduled for March 30, 2009 @ 7:30 with the Planning Commission to review the final draft. A second public hearing has been scheduled for May 27th, 2009 @ 7:30 at the Seisholtzville Fire Company to hear public comment and to possibly adopt the new ordinance.

All Roads Lead to Hereford

The Hereford Township Work Crew would like to remind you that it is against the law to push snow onto or across public roads.

- What it does is create a hazard. The snow packs and bonds to the road and *acts like a speed bump*. When it melts it creates ice and blocks drainage ditches.

We know that nobody likes to see the snow plow trucks come down the road after you have shoveled your driveway. If you shovel in the direction that the plow truck comes, it gives the plow truck a chance to empty out before it passes your driveway. You will get little to no snow plowed back into your driveway. Also please be patient with the plow truck drivers we are just doing our job to keep the roadway safe. So please do not tailgate the plow truck and give us time to turn the truck around at the Township lines.

We would also like to remind you that the Township right-of-way is 33ft. that would be 16 ½ ft. from the center line to the shoulder of the road. On some roads it is 53 ft. that is 26 ½ ft. from the center line. This is valuable information when it comes to:

- Installing fences along the road
Planting trees on the edge of the road
Keeping drainage ditches and swales open
Parking cars along the road
Installing mailboxes (**Note:** *the mail carrier should be able to get off the road safely*)

We cut shoulders with the motor grader throughout the year to keep proper drainage of roadways to protect the road from damage and to keep it clear from ice building in the winter to ensure motorists can drive safely.

For our paving project this year we will be paving Stein Road. We will begin road construction in May through August. A few things to watch out for are:

- The road being closed to install drain pipes
Trees being trimmed back
Grinding or reclamation of the road
Cutting shoulders with the grader
Installing new shoulders

A Message from the Tax Collector

Real Estate Tax time is upon us once again. Here are some reminders that will make the paying process go smoother for you. **If you will need a receipt, enclose both copies of your bill along with a stamped self-addressed envelope with your payment (if you intend to file for the Property Tax Rebate you need to provide a copy of your receipted tax bills).** If your taxes are paid by a mortgage company please make a copy of the bill for yourself before mailing it to them. Any questions or problems with the millage rates should be directed to the individual taxing authority (Hereford Township; 610-845-2929 or the Upper Perkiomen School District; 215-541-2446). If you have sold your property and are no longer responsible for the taxes, please call and notify Sharon Hilgar 610-845-3615 or send the bill back along with the new owners' name. Also, notify me of any address changes or death of spouse so we can update our files.

Tax Relief is high priority for all of us; currently there are 2 programs that you should be aware of. **The Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program** – tax help for seniors and disabled – with lower incomes – for more details of the program contact PA Department of Revenue online or by phone. You might also ask your income tax preparer if you qualify. **The Homestead Act** is a program funded by state gambling revenues to reduce school taxes for homeowners. You must be approved by filing an application with Berks County by March 1st. Those taxpayers who were enrolled last year saw a \$205 reduction to their school taxes. The amount of savings will change depending on the number enrolled and the amount of gaming revenues available each year. If you would like an application for the Homestead Act please call the Upper Perkiomen School District at 215-541-2461. You may also contact Berks County Homestead Office with any questions you may have at 610-478-6262 Ext. 5263. Applications are also available at the Hereford Township Office. In these challenging economic times it is up to the individual taxpayer to see that they reap the benefits from these programs.

The following are phone numbers that may be of use to you. Berks County Assessment Office 610-478-6262 (for all assessment questions). Berks County Tax Claim Bureau 610-478-6625 (questions regarding delinquent tax amounts for prior years). **Please remember to adhere to payment deadlines – DO NOT SEND PAYMENTS TO ME AFTER THE DATES PRINTED ON THE BILLS – I cannot process the payment after year end.** All payments for delinquent real estate taxes and per capita taxes go to the individual collection agencies (refer to notices you receive from them).

Remember these dates: March 1 mailing of County/Township Real Estate Bills and July 1 mailing of Upper Perkiomen School Tax and Per Capita Tax Bills. It is your responsibility to contact me if you have not received your bills within a week of these dates. It is also up to you to let me know if you have moved. **Don't wait – non receipt of bill is not an excuse for relief from penalties.**

CURATIVE AMENDMENT

On December 16, 2008, the Board adopted Ordinance 2008-03 which amends the Township Zoning Ordinance by making amendments which will allow for Continuing Care Retirement Communities in specific zoning districts in Hereford Township as a conditional use. The Board's decision to enact our own Municipal Curative Amendment is being challenged by Radnor Development Corp. in the Berks County Court of Common Pleas and the Board expects an outcome from this litigation shortly.

NEW ROAD CREW EMPLOYEE

The Board welcomes Craig Leiser, a Hereford Township resident who was recently hired as a member of the road crew. Welcome aboard Craig!

BUDGET

The 2009 budget was adopted and keeps the mileage rate at .08. This tax rate has not changed since 1996, but the Board, like many of our residents is struggling with lower revenues and increased expenses.

TIRE CLEANUP AT SUPERFUND SITE

For many years there has been a large number of tires that were stored on the former Crossley Farm property on Huff's Church Road. When the Tuttle family purchased the farm several years ago, they agreed to clean up the tires and after many setbacks, the Board is pleased to announce that the tire cleanup is underway and will be completed shortly. The Board wishes to commend the Tuttle's for their diligence in the clean up of this environmental hazard.

STEIN ROAD

The Board budgeted for the reconstruction of Stein Road which will include drainage work and resurfacing. A significant portion of the funds for this project will be provided by Judd Builders, whose "Brookshire" development is located off Stein Rd.

Did you know??

In March of 1948, the Community Fire Company # 1 of Seisholtzville, Pa., of Hereford Township of Berks County was organized after the need for a local fire company became apparent.

19 men who each donated one dollar started the Fire Company. In June of the same year the first engine, a 1929 Childs chain driven pumper was purchased which was housed in a garage in the rear of the former Himmelburger's store. This engine remained in service until 1961.

August 1950 was the time when the Ladies Auxiliary was organized to assist the Fire Company with fundraising events. In 1955, the original firehouse was constructed. The 1950's saw an average of 10 calls per year.

July 1960 the first 2-way radio system installed for better fire ground communication. Bingo also started in 1960. In 1961, the first tanker was received from the Civil Defense and the Childs pumper was replaced with the 1939 Autocar that remained in service through 1974 and is still owned by the Fire Company. In 1966, the firehouse grew by one bay. The 1960's saw an increase in calls to the high twenties per year.

1974 was an important milestone for the Fire Company as the first brand new truck was purchased a 1974 Hahn custom pumper that replaced the Autocar. In addition, during the 70's, the tanker was upgraded and a second tanker added along with a brush truck. The 70's saw the calls increase into the mid thirties per year.

Right-To-Know

On January 1, 2009 a new law gives the public more access to government records. It's the first change in the state's Right-To-Know law in fifty years. Governor Edward G. Rendell signed the new Right-To-Know law on February 14, 2008 fundamentally changing the way people access public records of their government. The hallmark of this new law, which fully became effective January 1, 2009, is its presumption of openness.

A Message From Hereford Fire Company

Smoke Detectors Save Lives!: A recent Survey conducted by the National Fire Protection Agency found that 96% of all surveyed homes had smoke detectors, but no smoke alarms were present or none operated in almost half (46%) of the reported home fires from 2000 – 2004. Many of the smoke detectors were found melted, with out batteries. Daylight savings time begins on Sunday, March 8. When you change your clocks, try to make it a habit of changing the batteries in your smoke detectors. And do the same when daylight savings time ends in the fall. This will insure that the batteries in you detectors will have a proper charge throughout the year. It is also a good idea to test your smoke detectors every month, by pressing the red button on the detector. The detector should beep when this button is pushed. If the detector remains silent, the detector should be replaced.

Springtime Reminder: With the ending of winter, and the beginning of spring fast approaching, the risk of brush fires increases dramatically. During the month of April, the weather warms to a point where people begin working outside, cleaning their properties of debris from the winter. If you choose to burn your trash, please follow these guidelines:

1. **NEVER BURN WHEN IT'S WINDY!** Even if you think "the wind isn't that bad", it probably is. A brush fire can start, and spread out of control in seconds. Any doubts, **DON'T BURN!**
2. **ALWAYS BURN IN AN OPEN AREA.** Never start a fire that's near a building, a field or wooded areas. Fields and wooded areas contain a large amount of dry vegetation that burn readily, and many structures have burned as the result of an out of control fire.
3. **ALWAYS KEEP AN EXTINGUISHER WITHIN REACH.** A garden hose or a few buckets of water works best. Should an ember catch the surrounding brush or grass on fire, you'll be able to extinguish it before it spreads. An even better bet is to keep the area around the fire wet!
4. **NEVER LEAVE A FIRE UNATTENDED!** Even if for only a minute. We have been called to many brush fires where the resident stated "I only went to get something to drink," or "I only turned my back for a minute, and it was already too late," You would be surprised at how fast a fire can start and spread, especially if it's windy. If you must leave, put it out.
5. **KEEP THE FIRE SMALL.** The bigger the fire is, the hotter it gets which makes it more difficult to extinguish. A good idea is to use a burn barrel. But be careful, embers from a burn barrel can cause a fire just as fast as one without.

Following these few guidelines will help prevent disaster. However, should a brush fire occur, **DIAL 911 IMMEDIATELY!** Don't try fighting the fire yourself. If you're not successful, the fire will only grow larger and be more difficult to extinguish. Remember. If you cause a fire, you are responsible for any damages that occur as a result.

BICYCLE PATHS AND LANES

Bicycle paths are defined as physically separated rights of way for the exclusive use of bicyclists and pedestrians. Bicycle lanes are defined as portions of the roadway designated for the use of bicycles. Where bicycle lane policies exist, shoulder lanes are 1m wide in each travel direction, separated from the roadway by a minimum buffer distance of at least 0.5m. This buffer zone is usually increased along sections of road with higher motor vehicle speed. Paved surfaces are required in the few states where bicycle lane policies exist.

Bicycle paths are also frequently created in green belts through and surrounding subdivisions, through established forested areas, along power lines, and in buffer zones along streams and tributaries. One hundred year floodplains are zoned to include riparian buffer zones to protect streams from the sediment of erosion, tree cover to cool the water to benefit aquatic life, cool and clean the air, provide visual and sound barrier, and offer space for trails and recreation. While they connect to schools, parks, shopping centers and work places, they exist in and of themselves for the exercise, recreation, social and health well being of the citizens.

Property values adjacent to or near green belts remained the same or increased in value according to recent studies, and crime rates were even less than surrounding sections because of the absence of motorize vehicles. Cyclists, traveling at slower speeds than auto traffic, may provide an 'eyes on street' presence in the neighborhood.

Funding for planning and development is available from local, state and federal programs, such as the Federal Surface Transportation Program (STP) Enhancement program.

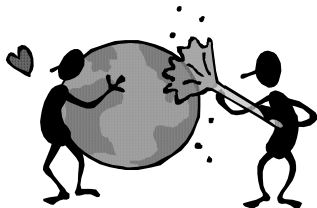
In Davis, California, green belt corridors have been part of the city's general plan since 1987. Plan policies call for ten percent of a proposed residential subdivision to be dedicated for green belts. All green belts include bicycle paths, designed to be connected to a citywide network. Requirements are waived for smaller developments. Davis can boast that with 53 miles of bike paths, 80 percent of all its collector and arterial streets have bike lanes or adjacent bike paths. Not bad for a 10.5 square mile city of 64,000 people.

The Perkiomen Trail, starting in Green lane Park and connecting with the Schuylkill Trail, extends all the way to Philadelphia. It is a picturesque trail to use any time of the year. Passing cyclists and walkers greet each other with a smile or a 'hello'. Reinvigoration can best describe the experience. Hopefully future plans will be to extend it to beautiful Butter Valley and Hereford Township.

The Environmental Advisory Committee (EAC) is proposing to the Township Supervisors that the concept of Bicycle Paths be studied and included in a zoning ordinance. Your expressed interest via the enclosed questionnaire, personal, and verbal support with Township officials, is encouraged.

Another solution to save spent CFLs for a community household hazardous waste collection, which would then send the bulbs to facilities capable of treating, recovering or recycling them.

Although household CFL bulbs may legally be disposed of with regular trash (in most US states), they are categorized as household hazardous waste. As long as the waste is sent to a modern municipal landfill, the hazard to the environment is limited. However, CFLs should not be sent to an incinerator, which would disperse the mercury into the atmosphere.

The mercury in compact fluorescent bulbs poses no threat while in the bulb, but if you break one you should take the following steps:

- Have people and pets leave the room, and don't let anyone walk through the breakage area on their way out.
- Open a window and leave the room for 15 minutes or more.
- Shut off the central forced-air heating/air conditioning system, if you have one.
